## TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

## July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003

During the past five years, there has been a steady and significant decline in the opening of ethical complaint files. There were 983 files opened during the past year, a decrease of 16% from 1,171 opened during a similar period last year, and a decrease of 40% compared with 1998 when 1,655 files were opened. The Board has received 33,263 complaints during the past twenty-seven years, resulting in 144 disbarments, 350 suspensions, 387 public censures and 2,523 private reprimands or admonitions. The nature of the files created and areas from which they arose during the past two years are shown on the reverse of this page.

The Board's *Consumer Assistance Program*, implemented in February, 2002, continues to be effective in resolving consumer concerns which do not rise to the level of serious ethical violations. During the past twelve-month period, the program has addressed 3,757 consumer concerns. There have been 3,533 instances of informal mediation. The highest frequency of other actions taken has been advising general information. The areas of practice for which the most concerns were received are criminal, domestic, general civil, personal injury and bankruptcy. There have been 1,484 referrals by CAP to other entities such as fee dispute committees, lawyer referral services, or to disciplinary counsel when problems cannot be quickly resolved by mediation.

The ethics opinion service, implemented in 1980 as a proactive program to prevent ethical misconduct, has resulted in 160 formal ethics opinions and 780 advisory opinions. Disciplinary Counsel have responded to 48,223 hotline phone inquiries from attorneys seeking ethical guidance, including 3,599 inquiries during the past year. Disciplinary Counsel also participated in 32 bar-sponsored ethics seminars during the year, attended by approximately 3,136 attorneys.

Attorneys are continuing to be proficient in the appropriate maintenance of trust accounts. There were 44 overdraft notices filed this year, representing an 85% decline in overdraft notices from 288 in 1995. The overdraft notice program was implemented in 1994, requiring trust accounts to be maintained in financial institutions which agree to report overdrafts to the Board. More than 300 banks are participating in the program.

The Board's practice and professionalism enhancement program, implemented in 1997, has resulted in two hundred-nineteen attorneys completing Board-sponsored ethics workshops as an alternative to discipline (diversion), or in connection with discipline concurrently imposed.

Tennessee attorneys have contributed \$22.8 million in annual Court assessments to finance the Board's programs, with no contributions from other sources. The annual attorney registration fees provided revenue in FY 02-03 of \$1,725,895. Additional revenues of \$124,042 have been received from interest, reimbursement of costs of disciplinary proceedings and prior fees and penalties, providing total Board revenue of \$1,849,937. Expenditures for FY 02-03 were \$1,886,363. The Board also collected and remitted an additional \$164,940 to the Supreme Court's Lawyer Assistance Program; and an additional \$156,150, totaling \$2.13 million since 1990, to the Court's Lawyers' Fund for Client Protection.
